From coast to coast, here are the most pampering and easily accessible resorts for families with kids below the age of six.

For a summer beach vacation, there are many convenient and luxurious family-friendly resorts across the United States and (slightly) beyond that offer wonderful babysitting services and kids' clubs to keep young ones entertained. These destinations coddle not just children but their parents, as well, with beautiful settings, excellent dining and pampering spas.

Sea Island, Georgia

Located in the Golden Isles of Georgia, a haven for the moneyed set for decades, Sea Island is a sprawling, Mediterranean-style resort that draws return guests year after year. Tots will be happiest at the beach club, which fronts a three-mile stretch of sand and calm waters and includes several pools and a café. The excellent Camp Cloister offers games, crafts and adventures for

children above the age of three. While kids are under the watchful eye of the camp staff, parents can relax at the spa or play golf or tennis at the resort's renowned clubs.

Hidden Pond, Maine

Set in the woods outside Kennebunkport, Hidden Pond offers a luxurious take on the classic summer resort. Perfect for families, the two-bedroom cottages have porches, fireplaces, full kitchens and washer/dryers. Each has a distinct, hip-farmhouse-style décor with charming touches like canary-yellow walls. Hidden Pond offers traditional resort amenities, including a main lodge with a swimming pool, a restaurant and a daily evening bonfire complete with fixings for s'mores. Parents will enjoy the Tree Spa treatments, delivered in three tree houses, and the fine dining at the property's Earth restaurant. Families can also visit the nearby Goose Rocks Beach.

Four Seasons Biltmore, Santa Barbara

Occupying 22 acres on a promontory on California's southern coast, the Four Seasons Biltmore is a collection of red-brick-tiled Spanish colonial buildings, including the iconic Coral Casino beach club, with its Olympic-size outdoor pool, huge fitness center, kids' pool, direct beach access and beachfront restaurant. The resort's Kids for All Seasons program organizes arts and crafts projects and movie nights as well as providing

> access to tennis and croquet courts. Grown-ups will appreciate the hotel's spa and its proximity to Montecito and Santa Barbara, which have wonderful shopping and dining.
